

It was, however, in English lessons where I had many opportunities for the learning of basic grammar rules that gave me a strong foundation in English.



Mrs Cumar was my Secondary 2 English teacher who believed very strongly in going through many grammar exercises using the school textbook and we, the students under her, spent many hours, both in school and at home, filling in the blanks and completing the drills.

In particular, I enjoyed the spelling and dictation sessions that Mrs Cumar would spring on the classes unannounced to sharpen our skills and to keep us on our toes.

In fact, both Mrs Winnie Tan and Mrs Judy Wong were also my English and Literature teachers respectively, when I was in Secondary 4 and from them, I grew to love the two subjects even more!

As I gained experience through the years as a teacher, I introduced different strategies to help students learn. For example, I used music to generate interest in the book 'I'm the King of the Castle'. I also used the strategy of 'hot seat', whereby I got the students to take on the role of the character and the rest of the students to ask the 'character' questions.

To meet the needs of the present generation of students, I try to engage them using a medium that they are used to, for example, the use of social media such as YouTube.

I feel I'm part of a heritage, a culture in PL, where we have committed and inspiring English / Literature teachers. All the teachers who have gone before taught not only the subject, but also character and values through the subjects.
